

Overview: This is an opportunity to make your own Viking Apron Dress, as worn by Viking women in the 9th & 10th centuries. Worn over an underdress, it is often made of linen. In this class, you will create your custom dress using measurements and traditional skills. You'll choose your fabric color in advance for the instructor to purchase and prepare. The \$50 will also include a large spool of matching thread.

You'll be able to complete your dress in the class, while picking up some history and learning about what is worn with this dress. You may even get a head start on an under-dress to wear with your new Viking Apron Dress! Instructor will have additional material and thread sets available for purchase for this purpose, outside the class.

Viking women had to carry the keys to the house and other household items. Clothing, at that time, did not have pockets. Some women hung their keys from a cord attached to their belts. However, it's much easier to have a vessel in which to carry one's belongings.

There are a few styles to choose from, and I will be teaching two different styles: a simple rectangular shape with a flap closure and a round drawstring style.

I will have kits for both styles. The fabrics will be faux leather in butter yellow and navy blue – and linen in a variety of colors. I will have available braid trims, beads, and embroidery threads for you to use as embellishment.

The kits will include a pattern, fabric, matching thread, and closures.

You will need to bring sewing needles, pins, scissors, and a ruler.

You can use a sewing machine if you bring one to camp with you, or you can make this entirely by hand.






Beginning students learn two positions for holding knives. They are designated as Position 1 and Position 2. Others have students use only Position 1 in the beginning. There are advantages to each approach. Try both to see which is most comfortable. The most basic shape in chip carving is a triangle. Many varied designs are simply different arrangements of three-cornered chips. One skilled chip carver says that a beginner should carve 250 triangles to begin learning the craft. This will help develop "muscle memory."

Examples of chip carving designs are found in many cultures, from Europe to the South Pacific Islands. It is one of the oldest forms of woodcarving, going back many centuries.

We'll also work on level 2 requirements and, if time permits, students will also complete the work required to receive a pin for level 2.

Chip Carving Level two: Carving Rosettes and Free-Form Shapes.





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
